

Anderson County

Founded 1801

One of the most diversified counties in Tennessee, is comprised of five incorporated municipalities and various communities, rich in history and tradition. In Anderson County visitors may gain a greater understanding of early America's Appalachia and glimpse the frontiers of science, energy, research and development.

Norris

Home to the first Tennessee Valley Authority dam, Norris Lake, Norris Dam State Park, the Museum of Appalachia, Norris Museum, and the Lenoir Museum . Norris is a National Historic City and a Tree City USA.

Rocky Top

Previous coal mining town, home of Coal Creek Miners' Museum, entrance to Windrock Park, gateway to National Scenic Byway (US 441), Devils Triangle Scenic Route (TN 116, TN 62) and designated ATV access in the city.

Clinton

The County seat was home of the freshwater pearling industry from 1895 to 1936 and the first desegregated high school in the South, commemorated by the Green McAdoo Museum; Ranked by Business Week in 2011 as "One of the Best Places to Raise Kids" and one of the Top 10 Antiquing Towns in the U.S. from Foder's Travel Guides. Clinton Higher Education Center, 47,603 square foot shared-use building for Tennessee School of Applied Technology and Roane State Community College opened fall of 2021. Aspire Park will open 2024.

Oak Ridge

Home of the Manhattan Project National Historical Park. Oak Ridge National Laboratory and Y-12 Security Complex offer extensive energy research and development that make the city one of the world's greatest research centers. A satellite campus of Roane State Community College is located in the heart of the city. The Melton Lake Rowing Venue features 30 miles of well-sheltered and calm water for championship regattas.

Oliver Springs

Home of mineral springs and a booming tourism industry in the late 1800's, the coal mining industry's beginning in the early 1900's, and the first commercial use of wind power to generate electricity by windmills at Buffalo Mountain Wind Park. Windrock Park is the largest privately-owned off-road recreation area in the country with over 300 miles of trails, 72,000 acres, 100,000 visitors annually.
