Anderson County Receives ThreeStar Award For Fifteenth Year

The ThreeStar Governor's Award Certification program is designed to focus activity for improvements in five key community development areas: Jobs & Economic Development, Fiscal Strength & Efficient Government, Public Safety, Education & Workforce Development, and Health & Welfare. These priority areas have been identified as critical to ensuring the success of Tennessee communities.

Participation in the ThreeStar program is based on an annual evaluation and activity plan. Local community leaders and Joint Economic and Community Development Boards are encouraged to implement activities that will impact the community's competitiveness in a global economy.

Participating counties (and cities in these counties) are eligible for a discount (for eligible projects) on both the business development and community development ability-to-pay calculations (CDBG and FastTrack) each year the county fulfills the requirements of the ThreeStar program. Additionally, only cities and counties that are active participants in the ThreeStar program are eligible to participate in other select TNECD Rural and Community Development programs. Finally, there is an annual grant for counties to serve as seed



Robotics team at CHS earning high scores And 'wins' in competitions

The Courier News The 2017-2018 RoboDragons were recognized at the Anderson County Schools Board of Education meeting on Thursday, Nov. 9, for the outstanding achievements they have accomplished in securing not one, but two, first place trophies in recent competitions.

ACCTC Director Kelly Myers introduced the team and their adviser to the school board.

Jimmy Davis, from Norwood Middle School, is the team's coach. Davis replaced Ben Barrington, the former coach who retired last year.

RoboDragon students showed the board the two first place trophies. The first trophy was won in September at a 'Robo Rodeo' competition at the Tennessee State Fair. The other trophy, won two weeks ago, was a first place obtained from the Battle for the Bluegrass competition in

Corbin, Ky. Students also showed board members their newest creation, a robot they designed, coded, and built themselves "from scratch," and is the robot they are currently using for competitions--and winning.

"I can't take the credit for this. It's

these kids who have done it," said Davis, who noted that it was the students' determination and hard work that made it possible.

More important than winning is the realworld experience students are getting,

Davis said. "This is an actual realworld application--these kids can get scholarships to college," he said.

Anderson County Director of Schools Dr. Tim Parrott agreed, adding that the Robotics class has opened up many doors for former Robotics students. Parrott pointed out to the board that some of the former students have been accepted into strong engineering schools like MIT and UT, and many others, and that their experiences on the Robotics team helped them gain a leverage. The Robotics team also asked the school board to provide funding to build a new robot pit.

A new pit would cost about \$2,500, said Davis. "A pit is kind of like a pit used in stock car (racing). It's where you take the robot during breaks and work on it, fix and adjust things. Our pit right now could use a little help.

We would love to see if we can get a new pit this year to continue and bring home some more first place trophies," said Davis.

A sk any business or corporation what is lacking in today's workforce. It won't be long before you hear the word "soft skills" mentioned. First impressions matter. Attendance and punctuality are essential. Interpersonal skills are key. In an effort to develop well-rounded students, CCS 4th grade students are participating in a program called Ace of Shakes in partnership with CNS.

Lt. Each year, TNECD will provide participating counties with a scorecard that documents progress indicators in the five focus areas. These indicators are used to aid the county in evaluating these key areas, the scorecard will document progress toward achieving the community goals set by local community leaders.

Again, this year, Janet Hawkins, Chamber Vice-President and Tim Thompson, President of Anderson County Economic Development Association, worked together to secure this award for Anderson County. Anderson County has received this award every year since 2002.

The County also received a \$5000 ThreeStar grant. The grants will be used for a variety of local programs addressing economic development, public safety, health, education and workforce development.

To be eligible to apply for these grants, each community must meet all ThreeStar program requirements. ThreeStar focuses on best practices in five key community areas, including jobs and economic development, fiscal strength and efficient government, public safety, health, education and workforce development.

"I want to congratulate these 63 communities on being awarded ThreeStar Competitive Grants,' TNECD Commissioner Bob Rolfe said. "I am excited to see these communities thrive with the assistance of these grants. The projects that each awarded county will be working on are innovative and show that these Tennessee counties are committed to improving as a community, which, in turn, will make our state succeed as a whole.'

"TNECD is proud to partner with these 63 communities as they make strides to invest in themselves and succeed," TNECD Assistant Commissioner of Rural Development Amy New said. "The ThreeStar dollars serve as a seed money for future economic investments and local initiatives across Tennessee as we continue to build our state's economy.

In total, TNECD has awarded \$975,000 to Tennessee communities through this round of the ThreeStar Competitive Enhancement Grant program. Funding for the program comes through the department's existing budget. TNECD is committed to helping communities in the areas that they prioritize on a local level. The projects are new programs or expand upon existing programs. All are based on the communities' ThreeStar planning process. The 63 counties selected were chosen out of 75 applications.

Gordon and his wife, Angela, celebrated 33 years of marriage this year. They live in Norris and have a daughter, Elizabeth, who lives and works in New York City




