



Living Classrom Coming to GOES

RS | CH2M Oak Ridge LLC (UCOR), the Department of Energy's (DOE) cleanup contractor for the DOE's Oak Ridge Reservation, has once again awarded several grants to educators all around Anderson County. The grants offered were \$500 per classroom and \$1000 per school. The grants go towards STEM focused areas - science, technology, engineering, and math. One of these grants was awarded to Sally Suttle and Shasta Gilliam, first grade teachers at Grand Oaks Elementary School in Clinton. Their grant will be put towards providing "A Living Classroom" for their 40 first grade students.

The Living Classroom project is one that is designed to provide a more in depth experience into the plant life cycle. Next year the science standards change which means there will be less teaching animal life cycles and more about plants. "It's going to be plants, plants, plants." said Suttle.



The students have always had gardens available, with about 10 raised gardens around the school being provided by the Healthy Schools Grant. This new grant will just allow a much more in depth gardening and learning experience for the students. "Our first graders this year are going to plant sunflowers. Our little ones for next year are going to be able to start right off by measuring and dissecting those and looking at their seeds. "Another part of the money will go towards getting cacti and along with a plant the students are very excited about, the Venus Fly Trap.

The students will also be planting watermelon, Jack-be-little pumpkins, and a salad garden consisting of baby carrots, radishes, cherry tomatoes and lettuce. Suttle said that Gilliam is in charge of the shopping. Suttle noted that they don't want to cut studying animal life cycles completely and that towards the end of the school year they will be incorporating the study of butterflies into their curriculum. She also said that they plant a lot of Zinnias to attract the butterflies.

Not only will the grant be used for buying plants but also just getting the gardens back in shape. According to Suttle, the gardens haven't had proper soil or mulch in a long time. "We just really appreciate the people that take interest in our school," said Suttle. "They are always so nice and so dependable. It's so nice to be able to renew those gardens."

"The idea that you can grow your own food and make the world a better place are tied together and the grant holds me accountable." Suttle pointed out that this is a very timely grant that connects the students and community and that she is excited to "dig deeper."

CES Recieves Donation for Teacher Professional Development

ommissioner Chuck Fritts and Commissioner Tracy Wandell (not pictured) from District 1, each presented a check in the amount of \$1,000 for a total amount of \$2,000, out of their individual Waste Management Accounts. to Claxton Elementary School Principal Jennifer Coleman. The money donated will be used to help the teachers at Claxton Elementary with Teacher Professional Development opportunities for the 2018-2019 school year. Several of the Claxton teachers have expressed an interest in attending conferences



that will advance their teaching practices, giving them the knowledge and strategies that will raise our student achievement levels. Normally the teachers would have to pay these expenses out of their pocket. This joint contribution will help these teachers with this expense.

C02 Dragster

Students at Clinton Middle School, Lake City Middle School and Norris Middle School will get the chance to put their engineering to the test thanks to a grant for a C02 Dragster ." In the C02 dragster project students use the engineering design process to design and create a C02 cartridge powered dragster car that can travel 20 meters in the shortest amount of time possible," said Madison Jones of Norris Middle. Jones championed the grant.

"I have my students use balsa wood, but I think the other schools may use basswood or pine. Balsa is so much less dense than other types of wood, and that makes for an easier experience when the students are using the band saw to cut out their design," Jones said on the design and makeup of the dragsters.

"While students are able to test their virtual car designs on the

"While students are able to test their virtual car designs on the computer, with our previous track system students were unable to see the amount of time it takes for their car to go from the starting line to the finish line," Jones said.

She stated that this is significant because without the time, students are unable to calculate the speed of their car. As part of this project, students will be required to use the formula for distance, rate, and time to calculate the speed of each class member's CO2 car.

Students will then compare the speed of the virtual cars they designed on the computer to the physical cars they build in class, determine which car performed best, and draw conclusions explaining their results.

All three schools will share the track. The track is portable and can be set up anywhere, so it will be going back and forth between the schools.

Additionally, two students each year will compete in a statewide Technology Student Association competition, and this track will help them test their car prior to competitions. "There isn't a limit to the number of times the track can be used, so we should be able to use it for many years in the future." said Jones.

ACHS FFA Wins First Place

ne Anderson County
FFA Chapter competed
in and won first place
in Tennessee in both the
FFA Environmental and
Natural Resources and
FFA Agronomy Career
Development Events on June
9 in Doyle.

The Environmental and Natural Resources (ENR) competition allows students to apply classroom knowledge to real-life situations. This event focuses on testing the students' general knowledge, problem solving and decision making skills in environmental and natural resources. These areas concentrate on soil profiles, water and air quality, waste

management, environmental analysis, and use of global positioning units.

The Agronomy competition allows FFA members to demonstrate their skills in solving complex problems related to crop production, agricultural knowledge and skills in the area of Agronomy. Additional activities include crop, weed, insect and seed identification, crop disorder identification; crop and seed judging and evaluation; and grain grading. A written examination was included along with a team problem solving competition.

Individually these students

excelled as well. In the state ENR contest Emma Johnson was first high individual, Treythan Beaty was fourth high and Desir'ee Burkett was sixth and Nicholas Leach was twelfth high individual overall. In the Agronomy contest the top four individual scores in the state contest were all Anderson County students. Wesley Zemke was first, Jordan Bowling was second, Tamara Heath was third and Jessica Kiser was fourth.

These two teams will compete in October 2018 in their respective national contest. Both teams are coached by Anderson County FFA Advisor Philip Warfield.





CCS Safety Patrol Takes on Washington D.C.




