Play-By-Play Voice for Tennessee Football and Basketball

The Anderson County Chamber of Commerce is proud to welcome featured speaker Bob Kesling, to our Quarterly Networking Luncheon on Friday, May 6, 11:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. at First Baptist Church of Clinton, Family Life Center, 230 N. Charles Seivers Blvd, Clinton, sponsored by Tennova Healthcare.

Bob Kesling was named lead announcer on the Vol Radio Network in 1999. He is the play-by-play voice for Tennessee football and basketball on the 70 plus stations on the Vol Network. Kesling also serves as the host for "Vol Calls", the weekly coach's call-in radio show and the "Big Orange Hotline" during the football season as well as the "Butch Jones Show" and the "Rick Barnes Show" on the Vol Television Network.

Kesling began his association with the University of Tennessee as a walk-on fullback on the 1972 freshman football team. His broadcasting career began in 1974 when he was hired by John Ward as a film editor for the "Bill Battle Show" on the Vol Television Network while he

was a student at the University of Tennessee.

In 1976, Kesling was hired by John Ward to serve as his spotter for Vol Network radio broadcasts. He sat beside the legendary "Voice of the Vols" for 15 seasons in the Vol Network booth spotting and handling pre-game, halftime and post-game interviews.

Kesling also has a long history with the Lady Vol basketball team. He served as the radio play-by-play voice from 1978 through 1999 calling Pat Summitt's first 6 NCAA National Championships.

WIVK radio in Knoxville named Kesling as its sports director in 1976. In 1980, Kesling was named sports director at WBIR-TV in Knoxville and was

Channel 10's 6 pm and 11 pm anchor until leaving that position in 1999 to join the Vol Network.

During his time at WBIR-TV, Kesling also work for Jefferson-Pilot on its SEC Television package. He joined the basketball network serving as pre game host and play-by-play announcer in 1989 and joined the football broadcasts as a sideline reporter and play-by-play announcer in 1992. He remained at Jefferson-Pilot Sports until he accepted the Vol Network position in

1999. His other credits include play-by-play announcer for the SEC football and basketball championship games on the SEC radio network, NCAA Women's Basketball Final Four on CBS/Westwood One

Radio Network, NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament on CBS/Westwood One radio network, college baseball on Fox Sports and Tennessee baseball and Lady Vol basketball on the Vol Network package carried on Fox Sportsouth.

Active in the community, he serves on the board of directors for Goodwill, the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, the Knoxville Sports Hall of Fame and was the 2013 United Way Campaign Chairman. In August of 2015 he was inducted into the Greater Knoxville Sports Hall of Fame.

A 1977 graduate of the University of Tennessee, Kesling and his wife Tami have two children Allison and Melissa.

The Appalachian Regional Commission awarded **Oak Ridge Associated Universities** a project to help substance abuse organizations within the Appalachian Region improve the use of social media in an effort to combat prescription drug abuse, drug overdose and related health problems.

The project will engage approximately 200 individuals and five local organizations in establishing effective social media campaigns in 2016.

WHY BUY LOCAL?

The Anderson County Chamber of Commerce Business Development Committee is an avid supporter of "Buy Local - Stay Local", a program designed to encourage residents of Anderson County to buy their goods and services in Anderson County for a good reason.

For every \$100 spent in Anderson County, consumers pay 9.75% sales tax on goods purchased. Therefore, the sales tax on \$100 is \$9.75. The State of Tennessee retains \$7.00 or

7%, with \$2.75 (2.75%) minus fees that returns to local governments. From the \$2.75 (2.75%) the State retains 1.125% for administrative costs and prior to distribution by the Anderson County Trustee's office, a 1% fee is assessed, leaving \$2.69 to be distributed as follows: one-half to the three school systems and the remainder returned to the municipality or county government from which it was received.

Consider the amount you spend in a month and how much of that expenditure you spend in another county, thereby contributing to their revenues. If you purchase \$100 worth of goods in another county, your "\$2.69" is retained by that county.

Anderson County has 31,652 households with the average household income of \$58,855.00. A typical family spends 15% of their annual income on groceries, which equates to approximately \$8,850 a year, or \$280 million a year on groceries that will generate \$7.5 million in local option sales tax.

Did you know that in Anderson County, the local option sales tax received in 2015, the 2.75% minus fees, equates to \$25 million in total revenues for Anderson County Government, the five municipalities and all three school systems?

However, leakage to surrounding counties remains staggering.

When you consider large purchases such as cars, appliances, building supplies, etc., ask yourself, "Can this product be purchased in Anderson County?" It could be more myth than truth that you will receive a lower price by going to a retailer in another county. Did you know that most retailers offer price matching? Do your homework. Provide the sales person an advertisement from local media or from the internet and you may receive the same price here in your county. Often apparent savings are more than offset by the additional costs of gasoline and wear and tear on your vehicle to travel to Knoxville or other counties.

There are over 2,600 businesses in Anderson County that contribute to the economic health of our County by payment of property tax (40% of the County's overall budget), business tax (about \$1.2 million annually), sales tax when supplies are purchased from other businesses and payroll

tax. Their employees receive a salary and have the option to spend their money in Anderson County. If goods and services are purchased in another county, their employees are likely to live in that county and spend their money in that county.

Revenues needed to operate Anderson County Government and the municipalities of Clinton, Norris, Oak Ridge, Oliver Springs and Rocky Top are derived from property tax, sales tax, business tax, gas tax, in lieu of tax payments, transfer taxes and mortgage taxes paid to the Register of Deeds, vehicle registration fees paid to the County Clerk, building permits, court costs, traffic tickets and other taxes from federal and state sources. Services provided to citizens from these government entities include police and fire protection, schools, ambulance services, garbage collection, libraries, roads, parks, etc.

Anderson County Government collects 41.5% of the property tax from commercial properties while 58.5% is collected from residential properties. One Big Box Retailer in Anderson County annually pays \$83,240 for one location and \$119,623 for the second location in property tax.

All local revenues including Sales Tax and Property Tax provide funding for the three school systems as follows based on "weighted average attendance": 0.576% to Anderson County Schools, 0.348% to Oak Ridge Schools and 0.076% to Clinton City Schools.

The "Buying Local Program", if successful, may contribute to lower taxes and provide an atmosphere for local retailers to not only stay in business in Anderson

County but also to grow in Anderson County.

Need another reason to Buy Local? Research has proven that for every \$100 spent at a local business, \$68 remains in the county by way of local supply purchases and business services, local taxes, wages and community donations.

Local businesses have a tendency to support the local community, patronize local establishments for both business and personal reasons as well as support community organizations. How many times have you seen the signs of a local business on the local ball field fence or a business name on the back of a youth's team jersey?

Finally, let me say a word about internet sales. Online out-of-state companies DO NOT support the local economy by job creation, property and business tax revenue or support our community organizations or schools. When we spend our money in Anderson County, it stays in Anderson County!!

BUY LOCAL – it's more than a concept – it's a way of life! Support the businesses that reinvest in our county's economic vitality, while maintaining the unique character and quality of life in Anderson County! Shop Anderson County first to support local business and keep tax dollars working in our community!

ANDERSON COUNTY CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ANNOUNCES STUDENT INITIATIVE IN ADVANCED MANUFACTURING

Anderson County Chamber of Commerce President Rick Meredith has announced a partnership with Anderson County Schools on a pilot program designed to bring student awareness of job opportunities in advanced manufacturing.

"Dream It. Do It. Tennessee is a competition that brings middle school students together with area industries to create videos that tell the stories of those industries," said Meredith. "When they're done, you can view the videos online and vote for your favorites."

The program, "Dream It. Do it. Tennessee" was co-founded by the Tennessee Chamber of Commerce & Industry and the University of Tennessee Center for Industrial Services. It's the result of an ongoing need to fill the hundreds of job vacancies that go unfilled each year in advanced manufacturing, and to encourage

a new generation of young people into the exciting and lucrative world of manufacturing in Tennessee.

Start-up costs for Dream It. Do It. Tennessee are underwritten by Consolidated Nuclear Security, LLC, the managing contractor at the Y-12 Nuclear Security Complex in Oak Ridge and the Pantex plant in Amarillo, Texas. Kristin Waldschlager is the CNS coordinator.

"Both at Y-12 and Pantex, we will need lots of skilled workers in the future," said Waldschlager. "Dream It. Do It. Tennessee, is designed to open the eyes of middle schoolers to the possibilities of careers that they hadn't even thought about."

Anderson County Career & Technical School Principal, Kelly Myers agrees. "The

students will get an opportunity to go 'behind the scenes' of local businesses and see for themselves what actually goes on. I think they'll be surprised and excited," he said.



Tennessee Chamber of Commerce & Industry President Catherine Glover said the Anderson County partnership is the first formal sub licensee of Dream it. Do it. Tennessee, and is the first East Tennessee Dream it. Do it. project.

Meredith said the program could not be happening without the support of Anderson County Schools and local industries.

"The industries see the benefit for their own businesses and were willing to step up and help. The Schools are excited be-

cause it opens the door for many of their students to the possibilities of a future career that might not include a four-year degree," said Meredith.

The participating industries include: Aisin Automotive, Techmer PM, SL Tennessee, and Eagle Bend Manufacturing. The participating schools are: Clinton Middle School, Lake City Middle School, Norris Middle School, and Norwood Middle School.

The student teams and their chaperones begin their industry visits in early April. Voting by the public on the finished videos will start on April 27 through May 4 on YouTube. Winners will be announced at an awards program on May 11, 2016.
