TCAT – Knoxville Anderson County Campus becomes a reality

A fter a long process, the temporary facility for Tennessee College of Applied Technology – Knoxville Anderson County Campus (TCAT) became a reality last week when the ribbon was cut on the newly remodeled facility. Over 100 people participated in the ribbon cutting ceremony, listened to stories from local officials about the process, and celebrated with cake and muffins baked by the Culinary Arts students at Anderson County Career and Technical Center.

In November 2016, then Senator Randy McNally, Representative John Ragan, and Representative Dennis Powers announced TCAT-Knoxville had received a \$5.7 million "Drive to 55 Capacity Fund Grant" to be used for a new permanent training facility. Then Senator McNally, who was also the Finance Committee Chairman, stated, "It is critical that we prepare our students with the skills they need for 21st Century jobs. This grant not only aids us in that effort, but also helps us bring new jobs to Tennessee as businesses are looking for a skilled workforce." According to the Tennessee Higher Education Commission, \$24.3 million was awarded to ten colleges and universities who had projects seeking funding and demonstrated a need for building capacity to respond to student enrollment and statewide workforce demands.

Because of the Tennessee Promise, first time freshman enrollment in Tennessee's colleges and universities grew by 10 percent in 2015, including a 25 percent increase at Tennessee's technical school. Tennessee has also seen a historic year-over-year growth in the state's college-going rate since 2015, increasing 4.6 percentage points in just one year. These increases helped sell the project to the state. Representative Dennis Powers said, "A skilled



and ready workforce is essential to bringing new and better paying jobs to our state. We appreciate Governor Haslam's and THEC's help in bringing this grant home to serve students in this region... We want everyone to know that High School is not the end."

According to the press release, "The Anderson County Board of Education and the Education Foundation for Clinton City and Anderson County Schools were instrumental in acquiring and renovating the facility. The Anderson County Chamber of Commerce, the city of Norris and Tim Thompson of the Anderson County Economic Development Association also played a major role in the process. The Anderson County Commission

For many abused children, their CASA volunteer will be the one constant adult presence in their lives.

"We provide an unduplicated service to the children in our communities. I take pride in knowing that our volunteers work tirelessly to fight for the children we serve. Our volunteers travel thousands of miles and spend hundreds of hours over the

CCS and Junior Achievement of East Tennessee

C linton City Schools has had a longstanding relationship with Junior Achievement of East Tennessee. These programs are designed to help prepare students in the areas of financial literacy and economics. With the support of many community members and the City of Clinton, Junior Achievement Activities continue to grow across our school system.

Each year, all grade levels K-6 participate in five Junior Achievement classroom sessions led by community volunteers.

Kindergarten: introduced to the importance of saving through storybook characters.

1st grade: learn how family members' jobs and businesses contribute to the well-being of the family.

2nd grade: learn about practical information about businesses and occupations.

3rd and 4th grade: learn about money management and how entrepreneurs use resources to produce goods and services in a community.

6th grade: learn about preparing for the working world and explore careers.

Students in 5th grade enjoy a full day experience through JA Biz Town. This program combines in-class learning with their visit to a fully-interactive simulated town facility located in just up the road in the Hollingsworth Center for Entrepreneurial Leadership. Students apply for jobs, operate banks, manage restaurants, write checks, and even vote for mayor of JA Biz Town. Students are immersed in real world activities in an effort to connect what they learn in school to what they will do as adults.

We added a new component to our collaboration with Junior Achievement this year. JA Biz Town Summer Venture Camp ran from June 26-30. Forty-two rising 4th-6th grade students of Clinton City Schools participated in this free event. During this week, campers took a look at what is important in a community. They designed a blueprint of their ideal city and determined the leadership that would be needed to be successful. Each camper decided what position they were interested in and applied, as well as interviewed, for the job. On day two, campers designed a business plan including budgets and financial obligations. They explored ways to get what they needed so they could open their business and get ready for customers. As they opened their businesses, they learned how to manage their money and use checking and savings accounts. On the fifth and final day. campers wrapped up the week by creating logos, producing product mock-ups (or service descriptions), and presenting their business ideas in a town meeting. Parents were invited to attend this final event.

Clinton City Schools partnership with Junior Achievement allows our students to participate in experiences that will help them be successful in society. This program helps us meet our goal of developing a well-rounded student. It is also a wonderful way for community members to become involved in the classroom! provided a \$250,000 grant for the project along with the state's grant."

Each year, the East Tennessee Development District holds an annual banquet attended by more than 130 local elected officials and staff members. During the award ceremony on July 13, ETDD recognized Anderson County for the development of the temporary TCAT campus. Tim Thompson of Anderson County Economic Development Association, who was instrumental in making sure the facility was acquired and renovated, said, "The most important economic development issue in our region is developing a skilled workforce. This TCAT facility will provide a pipeline of well trained employees for our industries in Anderson County. I want to thank the Anderson County Commission for their financial support for this project that will increase the employment opportunities for our citizens. Also, the funding for the permanent TCAT campus would not have happened without the leadership and support of Lt. Gov. Randy McNally.'

"As we work to expand access to education

through the Drive to 55 initiative, we must provide our colleges and universities with the necessary tools and resources so they can prepare students for the 21st century job market," Representative John Ragan stated. "This project will help accommodate more of our citizens who desire to obtain further education and training in these specific areas. This will ensure they have the skills needed to find good, high paying jobs in the industry upon graduation.

The temporary facility was placed in the 27,000-square foot Hensley's IGA building at the corner of Hwy. 61 and Norris Freeway. The Hensley family provided the facility rent free for two and half years with Eagle Bend Manufacturing and Aisin Automotive Casting providing \$60,000 for the renovation. This temporary facility will be utilized while the state builds a new, permanent facility in the I-75 Industrial Park. Anderson County Mayor Terry Frank said, "The temporary facility is finished and the new facility is currently nearing the end of the pre-design phase with construction completion targeted for the summer of 2019." Steve Emert, Chairman of the County Commission said, "We need the workers that this facility will produce."

The six-year long project is far from

complete. The construction of a permanent TCAT campus is expected to be completed by January 2019. The permanent facility will be constructed in the I-75 Industrial Park in Clinton on an 8.8-acre parcel of land donated by SL Tennessee. The facility will be 40,000 square feet and will offer courses in machine tooling, welding, industrial maintenance. mechatronics, automotive technology, diesel powered equipment technology and specialized training for local industries.

The temporary facility will house welding, injection molding, and industrial maintenance as well as other classes. Classes will begin in January 2018 and students can begin registering now. To register online, go to tcatknoxville.edu/ programs and chose Anderson County under locations.

Calling the ribbon-cutting an exciting day for Anderson County, TCAT-Knoxville Director Dwight Murphy said, "We could not have done this without the Hensley Family," to which there was a rousing round of applause. Jeff Hensley spoke on behalf of his family and thanked all the people for attending the ribbon cutting and for supporting their family during their fourteen years in grocery business in Norris.
