Clinton City Schools Visit Clinton Industry

Teachers and Guidance Counselors Tour Industry



Clinton City Schools recently collaborated with Anderson County Chamber of Commerce to allow 6th grade teachers and guidance counselors the opportunity to tour several of the manufacturing companies in Clinton. The Chamber planned a busy day where educators became familiar with Aisin, SL Tennessee,

A Team Approach to Student Health

Clinton City Schools is proud to have a community partnership with the Anderson County Health Department. This partnership was formed in an effort to protect, promote, and improve the health and prosperity of Clinton City Schools' students and staff. In conjunction with Clinton City Schools' Coordinated School Health Program, the ACHD is involved in a variety of health related services that benefit students and staff.





student dental health. Every year, members of the ACHD dental team venture into all three Clinton City Schools to perform dental screenings, cleanings, and sealants to students at no charge to the families. Parents receive feedback on any restorative work that needs to be completed for their child including fillings and extractions. Families without dental insurance can receive free dental restorative work for their child through follow up visits made possible by the Anderson County Health Department and the Elgin Foundation.

Providing free flu vaccinations to students is another role that ACHD undertakes in

preventing student illness. Flu vaccines are provided to students at each school in the fall each year.


Regardless of insurance or copays, these vaccines are provided free to



The health department is also a key support during school health screenings each fall. These screenings are conducted with students in preschool, kindergarten, second grade, fourth grade, and sixth grade. The purpose of these screenings is to monitor student health and to inform parents of any potential health risks.

Parents are provided information to share with their doctor when health concerns are involved, as well as, any pertinent literature to help support at home. Height, weight, blood pressure, body mass index, vision, hearing, and

color vision are screened each year for students in the grades mentioned above. If a student starts with Clinton City as a preschooler, they will have five complete health screenings during their time in the

school system.

This process would not be possible without the support of the ACHD, the student nurses at the University of Tennessee, school nurses, speech and language pathologists, and some special community volunteers.

Drug, alcohol, and tobacco prevention are other roles provided by the staff at the Anderson County Health Department. This year, ACHD nurses and staff provided educational programs to students in first and second grade about medicine safety, as well as tobacco prevention and the dangers of vaping to students in grades three through sixth. These programs took place during Red Ribbon Week across the school system. Each year, Coordinated School Health and the Anderson County Health Department have poster and essay contests related to tobacco prevention.

A fantastic initiative sponsored by funds from the ACHD Tobacco Grant is used to fund tobacco prevention programs at each school. Last year, the Healthy Life Clubs served more than 100 students in grades 4-6. These clubs were focused on the impact of making healthy life choices including a life free of tobacco and drugs. In addition, a physical activity





component had students involved in improving their skills as runners. Students that were involved in these programs showed significant improvements in their knowledge from a pre and post test about the effects of tobacco use and healthy lifestyle habits.

The Anderson County Health Department has also worked with Clinton City Schools staff through the promotion of the Healthier Tennessee Workplace Initiative. Last year, CCS staff were involved in using the Streaks for Small Starts app to monitor their progress toward increasing healthy habits. These Small Starts involved healthy, yet simple tasks, such as drinking more water, cutting out soft drinks, and eating five or more fruits and vegetables each day. Staff members with the most check ins on the app were awarded with prizes for working toward achieving a healthier lifestyle.

Truly, the health and wellness of Clinton City Schools' students and staff is greatly improved based on the committed partnership with ACHD. We would not be able to complete any of the projects mentioned previously without their vital help and support.

Clinton City Ranks as Top Energy Efficiency District in State

Many school systems across the state use energy efficiency loans to help replace outdated HVAC, lighting, and other facility needs. These loans are awarded to schools with an extremely low interest rate to encourage districts to become more energy efficient. A recent ranking was shared with Director of Schools across the state. We are pleased to share that Clinton City Schools is the 6th most energy efficient system in the state of Tennessee! On average, districts spend approximately \$310 dollars per student on energy costs each year. Clinton City Schools spends an average of \$182 per student! We attribute this savings to several projects across

the system replacing HVAC units and lighting. As part of our five-year capital projects plan, we intend to complete additional energy savings projects at both



North Clinton Elementary and Clinton Elementary. Every dollar we save on energy is additional dollars that can be used for student instruction. Clinton City is appreciative for all the efforts of City Council and the energy efficiency loans for making this high ranking a reality. Clinton City will celebrate this success and continue to look for ways to become more energy efficient in the future.

Flexible Seating: Giving Students a Choice

Clinton City Schools is one of thirty-one school districts across the state to receive a federal grant through the state department to support Universal Designs for Learning in our classrooms. This means that teachers in grades three through six are working together to share ideas and planning for a wide range of differentiation to meet the needs of all their students. Our teachers agement techniques. already do a good job working with a variety of academic levels by creating small groups for instruction based on student performance and assessment results. The teachers tailor instruction for each group and can identify individual strengths and areas to strengthen. However, when students enter classrooms, there are

other factors that impact their ability to benefit from instruction. These factors are the environment and management approaches. This grant, and the pro-

fessional development provided through it, is helping teachers examine their approach to environmental factors and behavior man-

The first step many teachers have taken is to "design" a space that works for everyone by altering the seating options in their classrooms. "Flexible seating" is an interesting modification to our traditional structure for classrooms. Students are benefitting from having chances to be comfortable in their environment,

> leading to better productivity and attention. So, as you enter several classrooms across our district, you may see students sitting on yoga balls, laying on yoga mats,



sitting on the floor by lowered tables or standing at raised tables. Having this range of options has led to unexpected benefits including: students staying more engaged, problem solving more readily, communicating more openly, burning more calories, using up excess energy, and increasing motivation and engagement. All of these benefits create better oxygen flow to the brain, improving core strength and overall posture. Research supports that physical activity is linked to higher academic performance, better health, and improved behavior. We are happy to be supporting these benefits. So, we are literally letting students "select their seats" – and that no longer means just which desk they want in neatly lined up rows. The best news of all is kids LOVE it!
