The Anderson County Chamber of Commerce is pleased to host the 18th annual Clinch River Fall Antique Festival on October 12th and 13th in Historic Downtown Clinton, Tennessee.

The festival will kick off on Friday, October 12th in the evening starting at 6:00 pm. Live music and entertainment will take place in Hoskins Park. Along with entertainment, food vendors will be set up as well. A Cruze-In featuring classic vintage cars will be displayed on Market Street. Shops on Market Street will also be open later hours until 9:00 pm.

Saturday, October 13th from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, over 100 antique dealers and artisans will line Market and Cullom Streets in the Historic District for an old-time street festival. Dealers from throughout the Southeast will provide shoppers and visitors a great selection of antiques and collectibles.

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
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The Chamber Gospel Fest

CCS Ranked Top Five in the State

n Thursday, July 19, the Tennessee State Department of Education announced achievement results for the 2018 TN Ready test. As part of the accountability system, students are grouped into three grade bands: 3rd-5th grade, 6th-8th grade and 9th-12th grade. Člinton City is a Pre-K through 6th grade system, so the school system attains rankings in the 3rd-5th grade band and 6th-8th grade band. Clinton City Schools was one of six districts across the state who ranked in the top five in a grade band cohort in both achievement and student growth. CCS' 6th grade attained top five rankings in two different testing areas: ELA (English/Language Arts) and Math. Clinton City was the only system to meet these expectations in two academic subjects. Williamson County was the only state district to attain top ranks in all three grade bands.

There are 144 districts across the state of TN. In terms of achievement, the 6th grade cohort in Clinton City Schools ranked 3rd in Math and 2nd in ELA. Clinton City Schools also ranked in the top 5 districts across the state in terms of academic growth.

Director Kelly Johnson stated, "Districts across the state of TN worked very hard this year on behalf of their students. I am extremely pleased with the results that have been released so far as it affirms the dedication, professionalism, and growth mindset in our Clinton City teachers and students.

We firmly believe in high expectations with an abundance of support.

We expect a great deal from our students, and they consistently rise to the challenge. These results could not be possible without our high-quality teachers, supportive parents, strong partnerships with the city of Clinton, and pride in the community."

Academy and met individually with CCS
Math and ELA Coaches to ensure that they
have the necessary content knowledge and
familiarity of the CCS instructional framework
to provide differentiated, personalized
instruction to students. Several teachers used
the summer to work towards completion of
advanced degrees, and we even had a staff
member write a children's book!



All administrators attended a 2 day Leadership Retreat where plans were made to continue to the "Tradition of Excellence" at Clinton City Schools. When not participating in professional development, there were many other things to do to prepare for the school year: create classes, hire and orient new teachers, analyze data, create school improvement and schools safety plans, create school schedules, parent meetings, purchase resources, create budgets, oversee facilities, and the list goes on and on.

School doesn't just happen. There is an abundance of work that is involved in creating a quality learning environment for our students. Staff members work endless hours on behalf of our children. Teachers and staff members never really "leave" for the summer in public education. Their minds are always working on how they can improve the educational experience for their students, and their hearts are always reaching out to how we can change the trajectory of a child's

life. Next time you see a custodian, teacher, support staff, or school administrator for any system, thank them. Education is not a job, it is a lifestyle.....and we love every minute of it! Welcome back!!!! We look forward to a great year!

In an effort to support the health needs of students, staff members have learned about food allergies, asthma, and other health conditions, as well as emotional supports for students. They have practiced using an Epi-Pen model in training with the school system led by the lead district registered nurse. Two staff members have participated in trainings to lead small group socio-emotional peer support groups. These groups will be available to students across the school system. This initiative is expected to expand as these teachers will train other staff members in the program. Clinton City Schools' staff members participated in Restorative and Proactive Circles training in an effort to build relationships and promote peer interaction, dialogue, and problem solving.

a Kindle Fire HD to the student at each school who read the most with the program. CCS is thrilled to announce the winners from each school:





Anderson County Mayor, Terry Frank speaks to LAC Class of 2019 during County Gov. Day


n July 17th, the Leadership Anderson County Class of 2019 spent the day learning about Anderson County's Government.

Anderson County Awarded ThreeStar Grant

n July 19th, Governor Bill Haslam and the Department of Economic and Community Development
Commissioner Bob Rolfe announced that 60 counties will receive ThreeStar Grants.
The grants will be used for a variety of local programs addressing economic development, education and workforce development, public safety, health and efficient government.

"Providing more opportunities for Tennesseans is one of our state's main objectives, and with the assistance of the ThreeStar Competitive Grants, 60 recipients will be better prepared for success," Haslam said. "The ThreeStar program is a great asset to help communities across Tennessee thrive, and I look forward to seeing each of these 60 communities continue to succeed." "I want to congratulate the 60 communities chosen in this round to receive the ThreeStar

Grants," Rolfe said. "The projects that these counties complete with ThreeStar grant assistance will enhance local communities by creating a better living and working environment for residents."


ThreeStar focuses on best practices in five key community areas, including jobs and economic development, education and workforce development, fiscal strength and efficient government, and public safety and health. To be elgible for this grant, the county must meet requirements in these five areas and show how the project will move the county forward in at least one of those areas. "TNECD is able to assist the 60 recipients of the ThreeStar Grants by investing in locallydriven projects that transform communities." Amy New, Assistant Commissioner of Community and Rural Development, said. "We are proud to partner with these communitieis as they continue to work

collaboratively to enhance their economic landscape."

In total, TNECD is awarding \$955,000 to Tennessee Communities through this round of the ThreeStar Grant program. Anderson County will be awarded \$5,000 as part of their ThreeStar Grant.
